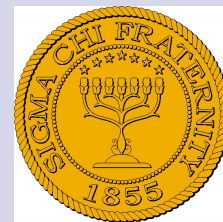

A Special Appeal from Bryan Dodson:

A full year on my end with Samaritan's Purse disaster relief throughout the US and Bahamas and international development projects in Tanzania and Uganda, with Columbia forthcoming.

Last month I finished some volunteer work through USAID's Feed the Future Program with St Anthony School For the Deaf in Nkozi, Uganda; a profoundly wonderful experience that filled my heart with joy. One of the significant challenges facing the school is lack of electricity; although power runs near the property, the cost of connection to the grid has been prohibitive. The school has been raising funds for the past 18 months and my friend Emily has launched a GoFundMe project as a final push to close the funding gap. Having personally spent 2 weeks working on projects for the school, I can attest to the significant impact of this project as a "cornerstone" for expanding educational opportunities, improving the well-being of the children, and ensuring the school's financial sustainability.

The campaign sponsor is Emily LeRoux, an intern from Canada, who has been doing some wonderful work with the school and students. It was very much a pleasure for me to serve alongside both Emily and Fr. Anthony (the founder) in supporting the children and this school; the selfless work of both is inspiring and brings so much light to the lives of these 67 children and their families.

The Alumni Association of the Iota Zeta chapter has been continuously active since our first brothers graduated. Years ago, the leadership of the Alumni Association created a Lifetime Dues program to build up resources to help fund future initiatives. Since its inception, [168 of our 546 initiated brothers](#) have joined the ranks of "Lifetime Membership". Proceeds from the lifetime dues program are invested in perpetuity with only the returns being spent to support alumni engagement activities (Pig Roast, Summer Reunion, milestone anniversaries, etc.) and support the Undergraduate Chapter (Leadership development - BLTW, Province Workshop and Grand Chapter; chapter house equipment and scholarships).



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You can choose to pay your Alumni Association Dues annually ([\\$30/year](#)), but many Brothers have chosen to become "Lifetime Dues" members ([\\$250 for current undergraduates/Class of 2019 graduates, \\$300 for alumni](#)). This gets you a nifty coin that identifies you as a Lifetime Dues member and a larger souvenir cup whenever you attend Pig Roast / Alumni Association weekend. Only the cool kids get to drink out of these special big boy cups!

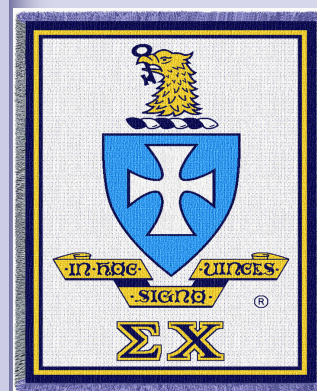


Hello Brothers,

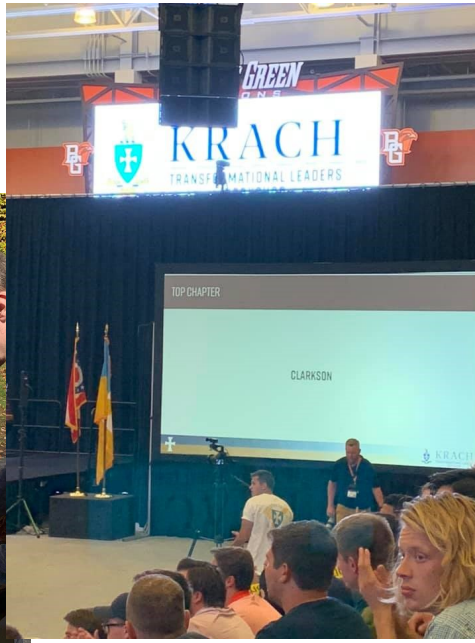

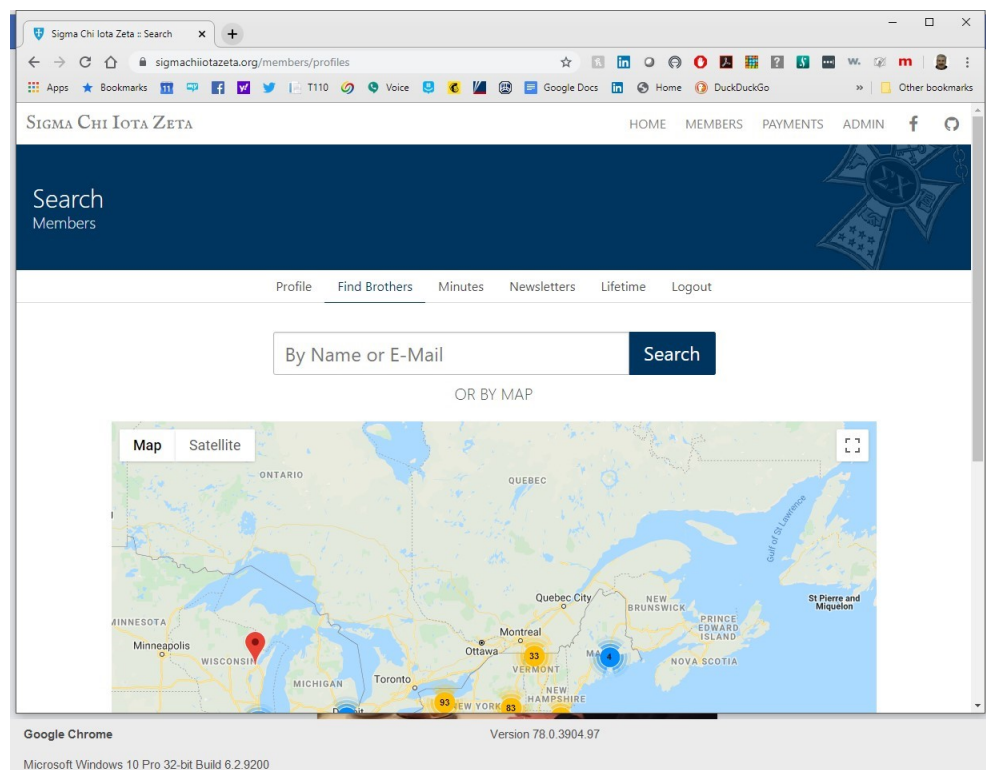
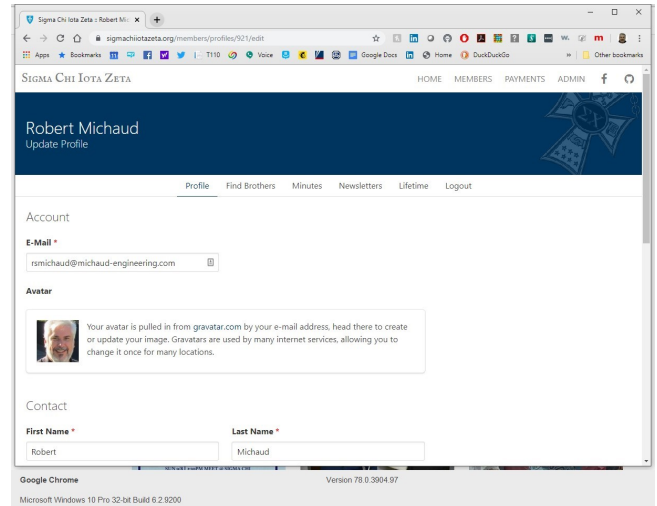
